

YSAS Festival of Ideas Summary Report 11th – 16th November 2020

Between the 11th-16 November 2020, YSAS hosted an online live streamed YSAS Festival of Ideas to share innovative, inspiring and thought-provoking ideas with YSAS workforce and other members of the Victorian and Interstate Youth, and Youth Drug and Alcohol workforce.

Over the course of the four days of the YSAS Festival of Ideas, interactive Question and Answer (Q&A) sessions were hosted between YSAS workforce members and YSAS Festival of Ideas guest speakers including authors, academics, advocates and other thought leaders

At YSAS, we believe that "a rising tide floats all boats" and in the power of collective action to create transformation and change. The YSAS Festival of Ideas centred voices and ideas we believe support the ethos of anti-oppressive practice, de-colonising principles and Intersectionality. Throughout the YSAS Festival of Ideas, we explored together not only the meanings of Intersectionality, Anti-Oppressive Practice and de-colonising principles but ways in which this ethos could be genuinely actioned and embedded into the heads, hands and hearts of the work that we do.

Centring Voices of Power and Transformation

Delivered over four days, the YSAS Festival of Ideas invited guest speakers to share their voices, wisdom, truths and experiences. YSAS Workforce members were invited to pre-submit questions to the guest speakers, as well as submit questions during the live-streamed sessions.

The YSAS Festival of Ideas considered issues such as structural discrimination, visibility and invisibility, genuine advocacy, transformation and legacy. Throughout the festival, participants and audience members were invited to critically reflect on issues such as power, representation, personal journeys and privilege. A range of sessions were presented including:

- Intersectionality: Beyond Diversity and Inclusion
- Youth Voices
- First Nation Voices
- Voices of People of Colour
- Women's Voices and Voices for Gender Equality
- LGBITQ+ Voices
- Voice and Action
- A final session where YSAS Leadership will critically reflect on the festival learnings

This year has been characterised by a series of major global and local issues including an escalating environmental crisis, devastating Australian bushfires, a global pandemic and collective social justice and human rights movements such as the Black Lives Matter action. The year of 2020 has involved rapid pivots in the ways that know ourselves and do our work.

Our hope is that the YSAS Festival of Ideas provided opportunities for members of YSAS and the wider Victorian and Interstate Youth, and Youth Drug and Alcohol workforce to pause, listen, reflect and share meaning-making and transformation as we collectively emerge from the events of this year.

Candice has an academic background in Community Development and Criminal Justice and a strong back ground in working with young people involved in the youth justice system and the AOD sector. Candice also has a background in arts practice, with over 10 years of experience facilitating therapeutic dance, music and spoken word poetry workshops with young people. Candice works from an intersectional framework with a strong focus on anti-racism and anti-oppressive practice and also on family violence and gender equality. Candice is currently working as the Team Leader of the Youth Support Service North and for the Wilum Supported accommodation program.

Session 1: First Nations Voices

Guest Speaker: Cormach Evans Hosted by: Carissa Watts, Bunjilwarra

Wednesday 11 November 2020 Livestreamed 10:30-11:45

This session was hosted by Yorta Yorta Dja Dja Wurrung singer/songwriter and Bunjilwarra Health Worker Carissa Watts, and explored the wisdom and power of First Nation voices, the need for truth-telling and truth-listening and the journey for justice and healing. Throughout their discussion, Carissa and Cormach shared their views on many important issues including:

- Cultural Safety, including what it meant in ethos and action for an organisation to be culturally safe.
- The connections between thriving and resilience
- Ways in which organisations can meaningfully celebrate NAIDOC week
- Strategies for organisations to deeply embed decolonisation, engage in genuine allyship and support First Nations Voices and experiences
- The importance of land and ocean conservation



Cormach Evans

Cormach Evans is a father of two and Yorta Yorta man that lives on Wadawurrung Country, at is 30 years old Cormach has achieved many incredible achievements in his journey in life.

Cormach is the Founder of Aboriginal Youth Organisation Strong Brother Strong Sister, which supports Aboriginal Children and Young People to achieve their greatest dreams, goals and aspirations whilst ensuring connections to culture, community and positive social, emotional health and wellbeing through mentoring and Youth Groups across Victoria to ever 1000 Aboriginal Children and Young People and emplacement opportunities for to have 10 Aboriginal Young People since founded in 2017.

Cormach has paddled from Papua New Guinea back to Cape York Australia in a traditional canoe he made with friends and traditional owners of Saibai Island in the Torres Strait, and hunted and gathered all his own food over the 3 week journey. From this paddle Cormach raised money to start the Strong Brother Strong Sister Journey.

Host: Carissa Watts: Carissa Watts is a Yorta Yorta Dja Dja Wurrung singer/songwriter. She is very passionate about creating culturally safe spaces and self-determination for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Carissa works at Bunjilwarra as the cultural coordinator and also at the Koorie Heritage Trust as a Cultural Awareness Educator.


- The definition of intersectionality and how it expands upon diversity and inclusion

As an international festival and conference presenter, Tasneem's most recent appearances include: the IABC World Conference (Bahrain), the Bradford Literature Festival, (UK) and The Concordia Forum, (Canada).

Thursday 12th November 2020 Livestreamed: 9:30am -10:45am

Hosted by YSAS Finance Officer Catherine Aoll, this session discussed diversity in women's voices, gender equality and the need for collective action to prevent family violence. Together, Catherine, Tarang and Nyadol explored:

- Representation of women in Australia
- The role of men in Family Violence prevention
- Barriers victim/survivors experience in seeking support for family violence
- · Strategies for and tensions in the celebration of women's achievements and successes
- Personal transformation, resilience and vulnerability
- Personal and social accountability for violence prevention
- The role of social media in change making



Tarang Chawla

Tarang Chawla is a writer, lawyer, anti-violence campaigner, mental health advocate and suicide survivor. Tarang founded Not One More Niki after his sister Nikita was murdered in 2015 by her ex-partner. He is a Young Australian of the Year Finalist, IABCA Community Achiever of the Year and Our Watch Ambassador. He was recently named as one of the 40 Under 40 Most Influential Asian-Australians.



Nyadol Nyuon

Nyadol Nyuon was born in a refugee camp in Itang, Ethiopia, and raised in Kakuma Refugee camp, Kenya. In 2005, at the age of eighteen, she moved to Australia as a refugee. Since then, Nyadol has completed a Bachelor of Arts from Victoria University and a Juris Doctor from the University of Melbourne. She now works as a commercial litigator with Arnold Bloch Leibler.

Nyadol is a vocal advocate for human rights, multiculturalism, the settlement of people with refugee experiences and those seeking asylum. Nyadol is also a regular media commentator in these areas, having appeared on ABC's The Drum, as a panellist on Q&A and contributing to The Age, Sydney Morning Herald and the Saturday Paper, to name just a few.

In 2018 her efforts to combat racism were widely recognised, with achievements including the Australian Human Rights Commission's Racism. It Stops With Me Award. The prestigious award was in recognition of her advocacy and activism on behalf of the Australian-African and Melbourne's South Sudanese communities. She also received the Afro-Australian Student Organisation's Unsung Hero Award.

Host: Catherine Aoll: Catherine is on her sixth year at YSAS and works in the Finance department as Finance Business Partner. Outside YSAS she is a speaker, mentor and working to complete her book on resilience.

Session 4: LGBITQ+ Voices

Guest Speakers: Jason Ball and Helen Barnacle Hosted by: Bianca Johnston, Family Violence Specialist *

Thursday 12th November 2020 Livestreamed: 11:00am – 12:15pm

This session proudly and loudly explored LGBITQ voices and the strengths and struggles of their expression. Throughout the session, Jason, Helen and Bianca explored a range of issues including:

- The links between homophobia, inequality, discrimination and unhelpful gender binaries
- The evolution of the LGBITQ+ acronym
- Diverse representation in sport, including the importance of Women's AFL
- The use of creative arts in expressing one's voice
- · Harm minimisation and prison reform
- Strategies for ensuring strong and visible LGBITQ+ voices

Jason Ball

Jason Ball is a pioneering LGBTIQ and mental health advocate, who in 2012 came out as gay and spearheaded a campaign to tackle homophobia in the AFL. Jason is an ambassador for Beyond Blue, the Victorian Pride Centre and is the Co-founder of Pride Cup Australia. In 2017, Jason was named Young Australian of the Year for Victoria, and in 2016 and 2019 he stood as a Federal candidate for the Australian Greens.



Helen Barnacle

Helen Barnacle is a Psychologist, counsellor and advocate for prison reform. Her novel "Don't let her see me cry" describes her early experiences of heroin use, motherhood and being sentenced to the longest drug-related prison term in Victoria. She is a musician whose work has involved a variety of arts-based work across a range of justice settings, including with the group Liminal Lines Inc.

Host: Bianca Johnston, Family Violence Specialist: Bianca is a Social Work and Criminologist with 14 years direct practice. Originally from the Sunshine Coast, Bianca has undertaken a variety of different roles at YSAS and currently coordinates and delivers the YSAS Family Violence Project. A specialist in working with young women, Bianca is completing a Masters of Philosophy (via research) through Monash University exploring young women's experiences of intimate partner violence. She is passionate about creative therapies, visual art and environmental and social justice.

Session 5: Voices of People of Colour

Friday 13th November 2020 Livestreamed: 9:30-10:45

Hosted by Glen Iris Residential Withdraw Assistant Manager, Pauline Huynh, this session explored the power of People of Colour's voices, the importance of spaces for People of Colour, the use of social media in creating action and the Black Lives Matter movement. Throughout the session, Saba, Tigist and Pauline considered:

- The ways in which trauma, resilience and community are framed
- Ways in which non-for-profits could become complicit in oppression including risks of creating reliance and reinforcing deficiency narratives
- Strategies in which individuals and non-for-profits can positively engage with and support communities
- Structural bias and systemic racism including how this impacts identity of individuals and communities
- · Issues of white privilege, saviour complex and guilt
- The problems with tokenism and selective representation
- The differences between genuine and problematic allyship
- Social media activism and strategies for change both on and off social media.



Tigist Kebede

Tigist Kebede is an inclusive counsellor. She employs trauma informed, decolonizing and intersectional frameworks into her practice and advocacy. She is the founder of "The Tena Therapist" a social media mental health platform and works for Pola Psychology a culturally inclusive practice.





Saba's entrepreneurial journey began at 22 years whilst studying a double degree. She started with an employee health and wellbeing consulting and making a business shift to share her culture through food by launching Saba's Ethiopian restaurant with her mother as the head chef, at the age of 25. Saba's Ethiopian Restaurant was awarded top 5 Good Food Cheap Eats 2017. It also was positively reviewed in New York Times in 2018. She then launched Afro Hub; a social enterprise, showcasing live music, artwork, food, fashion, design, photography and film created by Melbourne-based artists hailing from various countries on the African continent. The mission is simply to enable the financial, social and artistic flourishment of the African community In Melbourne. Afro Hub has partnered up with Melbourne Writers Festival, Melbourne International Comedy Festival, showcased at NGV, hosted a festivals at Immigration Museum and many other events showcasing non performative bla(c)k art.

Host: Pauline Huynh: First and only born in Australia from a family of Vietnamese migrants. A youth and AOD worker for 16 years with the last 4 years in YSAS. Passionate about working with diverse communities and People with Colour from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Session 6: Young People's Voices

Friday 13th November 2020 Livestreamed: 11:00-12:15pm

Hosted by YSAS Youth Advocate Tamlynn Collins, this session explored Young People's Voices and the power that they hold for change and action. This session also included a spoken word poetry performance by the incredible Zaynab Farah! During the session, Nevo, Afadang and Tamlynn explored:

- Body diversity and size discrimination including the word "fat"
- Social media's role in activism and risks in creating echo chambers
- Strategies for social media hygiene
- LGBITQ+ activism, allyship and visibility
- The importance of diverse expression and listening to of young people's voice



Afadang (Affy) Akuey

Afdang is a 23 year old South Sudanese woman. Currently working as a registered nurse in a mental health facility. Also the director of Twich Women's Sewing Collective, a social enterprise which aims to train women from non-English speaking backgrounds and provides them with job opportunities. I am passionate about social justice, mental health awareness and intersectional feminism. I have also run workshops and sessions about educating people on the different types of racism and how it can effect people sometimes over generations.



Nevo Zisin

Nevo is a queer, non-binary, Jewish writer, performer, activist and public speaker based in Naarm / Birraranga / Melbourne. They run workshops in schools and professional development trainings in workplaces around transgender identity & language. Author of award-winning Finding Nevo, a memoir on gender transition and a contributor to Kindred: A Queer Australian Young Adult Anthology. They are a mentor for The Pinnacle Foundation, one of Out for Australia's 30 Under 30 for 2019, an ambassador for Wear It Purple Day and the Victorian Pride Centre as well as a member of the Gender Euphoria cast - Australia's largest all trans & gender diverse show on a main stage.

Zaynab is a Somali spokenword artist based in Naarm (Melbourne). Her pieces explore intricate personal experiences and topics that she's very passionate about. Zaynab has performed on various platforms around Melbourne and is the 2019 Victorian Australian Poetry Slam Champion.

Host: Tamlynn Collins: Hi I'm Tamlynn Collins, Youth Advocate – Community at YSAS working on a project around stigma and discrimination, my interests include young people having their voice heard along with equal rights for all.

Hosted by YSAS Youth Empowerment Project (YEP) Outreach AOD Worker Shannon Bell- Voice and Action explored the meaning of voice, ways to take action and the different moments and methods of change making. Throughout this session, Santilla, Tavale and Shannon considered

- The privileging of certain historical narratives and invisibility afforded to others
- Cultural dignity, Cultural intelligence and the concept of Va
- The emotional labour of anti-racism work and need to expand to more nuanced conversations about intersectionality and embodiment of change
- Whether culture is inherent or separate to work
- Filmmaking and other platforms for expression of stories, narratives and voices



Santilla Chingaipe

Santilla Chingaipe is a journalist and filmmaker whose work explores migration, cultural identities and politics. Chingaipe is a regular contributor to The Saturday Paper, and serves as a member of the Federal Government's Advisory Group on Australia-Africa Relations (AGAAR).

The recipient of a number of awards, she was recognised at the United Nations as one of the most influential people of African descent in the world in 2019. Her first book of non-fiction detailing the untold stories of convicts of African descent transported to the Australian penal colonies, is forthcoming with Picador in 2021.



Tavale Ilalio

Tavale is the Founder and Creative Director of Mahana Culture. Born in Samoa, raised in New Zealand, culturally awakened in the USA and now settled in Melbourne (aka stuck here with little Australians that call him Dad!), he brings a unique perspective on culture and its strengths if respected and risks if not dignified and acknowledged.

With over twenty years management experience in the Public Sector spanning across four countries, Tavales passion to create safe and culturally responsive individuals, teams, organisations and communities drove him to bring to life the vehicle for this work which is Mahana Culture, a business which delivers on the capacity building required to truly lean into cultural responsiveness in practice. Full of energy and passion, Tavale is super pumped to be joining the Festival of Ideas movement, adding some value to the conversation and listening and learning from other leaders and innovators in the space.
